THE NEED OF THE DYING—LIFE'S HEALING

We have been regenerated and, day by day, we may contact the Lord, the living Spirit, for our satisfaction. In addition to this, we need healing. We are all sick and dying people. We are fallen people, weak and fragile, who are dying and who need the Lord's healing. If you have the healing of the Lord Jesus, your dying will become living....

Romans 8:11 says, "But if the Spirit of Him who raised Jesus from among the dead dwells in you, He who raised Christ Jesus from among the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through His Spirit who indwells you" (Recovery Version). If we allow the indwelling Spirit to make His home in our being, this indwelling Spirit will saturate our dying, mortal body with resurrection life. Our mortal body will be enlivened, quickened, and healed with the divine life. Romans 8 reveals that our spirit, soul, and body all may receive the divine life. When we believe in the

Lord Jesus, He, as the life-giving Spirit, comes into our spirit. Since He is the life-giving Spirit, the Spirit in Romans 8:2 is called the Spirit of life, meaning that the divine Spirit is life. When we called on the Lord Jesus, this divine Spirit who is life came into our spirit and enlivened it. Therefore, our spirit is life (Rom. 8:10). When we set the mind of our soul upon the spirit, our mind also becomes life (Rom. 8:6). If we give ground to the indwelling Spirit, the Spirit will spread Himself from within our spirit through our soul into our body, making our mortal body a body full of life. Eventually, this divine life becomes a fourfold life: the life in the divine Spirit, the life that fills our spirit, the life that will saturate our soul, and the life that will permeate our body. Our whole being—spirit, soul, and body—will be filled, saturated, and permeated with the divine life. This is healing. Whenever the divine life enters into a part of our being, it heals that part. This means that the divine life changes the death of that part of our being into life. Death is swallowed up by life—this is healing.

HOLDING FORTH THE WORD OF LIFE

"Holding forth" means to apply, present, or offer, whereas "the word of life" refers to Christ Himself (1 John 1:1) with His living word. So "to hold forth the word of life" means that the believers as children of God present the living Christ to those around them. The word of life is different from the doctrine of dead letters. In John 5:39-40 the Lord condemned the persecuting Jews because they searched the Scriptures but were unwilling to come to Him that they might have life. As a result, they were deadened by the killing letters of doctrine (2 Cor. 3:6a). In contrast, when the Scriptures and Christ go together,

objective pattern, but through Christ as the indwelling Spirit (1:19; Rom. 8:9, 11), this pattern becomes wonderfully subjective to us. In this way, Christ Himself as our pattern also becomes our daily salvation (Phil. 2:12). Thus, we work out our own salvation by living out Christ. This salvation is by God operating in us (v. 13) the willing (inwardly) and the working (outwardly) to save us in a practical way. Eventually, as we cooperate with God who is operating within us, we live out Christ, presenting Christ to others as the word of life. The Christ we experience as the pattern becomes our salvation

they are God's living breath (2 Tim. 3:16), even words of life, enlivening all those who receive them (John 6:63). When we are filled with these "words of life" by prayerfully reading the Scriptures, we are supplied to present Christ to those around us.

How do we experience holding forth the word of life? This requires that we see the relationship between four crucial matters mentioned in Philippians 2:1-16: Christ as the pattern of our Christian life (vv. 5-11); working out our own salvation through obedience (v. 12); God operating in us both the willing and the working for His good pleasure (v. 13); and holding forth the word of life (v. 16). Christ, the selfemptying and self-humbling One who was exalted and glorified by God, is the pattern for our Christian life. His earthly life is not merely an

through God operating in us. Then in our living of Christ, we present Christ to others, holding forth the word of life.

This was Peter's experience in Acts 5:20 when the angel told him, "Go and stand in the temple and speak to the people all the words of this life" [emphasis added]. Peter's living out the divine life was so prevailing that even the angel observed it and pointed it out to him. In this way, Peter was holding forth the word of life. Therefore, "holding forth the word of life" is equivalent to living Christ (Phil. 1:21), expressing Christ, and working out our own salvation (2:13). It is an issue of the experience of Christ.

THE SECRET OF EXPERIENCING CHRIST

If we would enjoy Christ and experience Him, we must have the Spirit, and we must also have faith. Without the Spirit, how can we experience Christ? And without faith, what way do we have to enjoy Christ? If we would have the Spirit and the faith to experience Christ and enjoy Him, we must come to the Word again and again. Faith and the Spirit are found in no place other than the Word. The more we get into the Word, the better. The Christian life is a life that is continually dealing with the

our spirit. I studied the classical writings of Confucius, but none of those writings touched my spirit. Certain writings may stir our emotions, but only the Word of God can inspire our spirit. Only one book—the Bible—is able to touch our spirit. According to Hebrews 4:12, the Word of God is a sharp sword that even divides soul from spirit.

John 4:24 says that God is Spirit and that those who worship Him must worship Him in spirit. In worshipping

> God it is best to deal with His Word. But when

we read the Word,

we should use not only our eyes and our mind, but especially our spirit. When many Christians read the Bible, they just read with their eyes and try to understand with their mentality. They stop short of allowing the Word to touch their spirit. If we want the Word to touch our spirit, we should pray-read the Word....

Colossians 3:16 charges us to let the word of Christ dwell in us richly. If we would let the word of Christ dwell in us, we need to receive the Word by means of all prayer. According to the Bible, the ultimate way to receive the Word is to pray it. Let us use Philippians 3:17 as an illustration: "Be imitators together of me, brothers, and observe attentively those who thus walk as you have us for an example." You may be inspired by reading this verse. But only when you pray will this word get into you. How good it is to take such a verse into us by prayer! When we pray-read the Word, the Word does not stay in our mouth, but enters into our inner being. This is to receive the Word by means of prayer.

As we pray the Word, the Word enters into the very depths of our being.

As an elderly man with many years of experience, I can testify that the best way to take the Word is by means of all prayer. By praying the Word we drink the living water in the Word. Then this living water fills our inner being and causes us to be nourished and healthy. In 1 Timothy 6:3 and 2 Timothy 1:13 Paul uses the expression "healthy words." When we pray-read the Word, the Word becomes to us the healthy Word. By this healthy Word we experience Christ.

divine Word. The Word must be before our eyes, in our spirit, in our heart, in our mind, in our mouth, and on our lips. Our whole being must be saturated with the Word of God. When the Word is outside us, it is simply the Word. But when the Word enters into us, it becomes the Spirit who gives us the faith to enjoy Christ and experience Him.

EXERCISING THE SPIRIT TO PRAY-READ THE WORD

The books of Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, and Colossians all have a particular emphasis. But if we put these books together, we see five things that are crucial for our experience of Christ: the Word, faith, the Spirit, our spirit, and prayer. If God had not created us with a spirit, we would not be able to receive inspiration from the Word, no matter how many times we may read it or repeat parts of it. The inspiration which comes from the Word is not a matter of emotion. Human words may touch our emotion, but they do not touch
